Anointing of the Sick: Anyone who is seriously ill is invited to contact the rectory to request the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and Holy Communion.


Parish Devotions

A Message from the Pastor

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time: Following Him

The Gospel of Mark does not begin with a narrative about Jesus' birth. Instead, Mark begins by reporting on the preaching of John the Baptist. John is described as the voice in the wilderness sent to prepare the way of the Lord. Immediately after describing the work of John the Baptist, Mark reports on Jesus' baptism and his temptation in the desert. Jesus' public ministry begins after the arrest of John the Baptist. Mark wants his readers to understand the important connection between the end of the ministry of John the Baptist and the beginning of Jesus' own ministry.

The calling of the brothers in today's Gospel evokes Elisha's commissioning by the prophet Elijah. As Elijah comes upon Elisha working on his family's farm, so Jesus sees the brothers working by the seaside. And as Elisha left his mother and father to follow Elijah, so the brothers leave their father to come after Jesus. Jesus' promise to make them "fishers of men," evokes Israel's deepest hopes. The prophet Jeremiah announced a new exodus in which God would send "many fishermen" to restore the Israelites from exile, as He once brought them out of slavery in Egypt.

By Jesus' Cross and Resurrection, this new exodus has begun. And the apostles are the first of a new people of God, the Church, a new family based not on blood ties, but on belief in Jesus and a desire to do the Father's will. From now on, even our most important worldly concerns, family relations, occupations, and possessions, must be judged in light of the Gospel, Paul says in today's Second Reading.

The first word of Jesus' Gospel, *repent*, means we must totally change our way of thinking and living, turning from evil, doing all for the love of God. And we should be consoled by Nineveh's repentance in today's First Reading. Even the wicked Nineveh could repent at Jonah's preaching. And in Jesus we have "something greater than Jonah." We have God come as our savior, to show sinners the way, as we sing in today's Psalm. This should give us hope, that loved ones who remain far from God will find compassion if they turn to Him.

Mark's Gospel is told with a great sense of urgency and immediacy. Jesus is a person of action, and events occur in rapid succession. We see this in today's Gospel. Time is of the essence; the fishermen immediately put aside their livelihood to become Jesus' disciples. The Kingdom of God is here and now. The time of fulfillment is at hand. How might our lives be different if we more fully shared this sense of the immediacy of God's kingdom? But we, too, must continue along the path of repentance, striving daily to pattern our lives after His.

MPB Bible Study -- 'The Turning Point'

The Turning Point is a nine-session Bible study experience for people who want to get to know Jesus in the Scriptures but don't know where to start. It takes place Wednesdays from January 24 through March 27. Participants have the choice of one of two sessions: 10:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. The fee is \$15.

The study will introduce you to people and stories in the Gospel of John not found anywhere else in the Bible: the woman at the well; a man named Nicodemus; the woman caught in adultery; and Lazarus, the friend Jesus raised from the dead. It includes stories about Jesus turning water into wine at the wedding in Cana, Jesus washing the feet of his disciples, and Peter's marvelous redemption after he denies Jesus three times.

The people in these stories were transformed by their encounters with Jesus. By entering into their miraculous stories, those in the study will encounter Jesus in a personal way and develop a deeper relationship with him that will transform one's everyday life.

Most Precious Blood has a Holy Hour every Wednesday at 1:00 p.m. as well as First Friday following morning Mass until 11:00.

Time 'spent' in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest gift you can give God and the most rewarding nourishment you can give yourself. Let us fill our Churches and Chapels with adorers, so we may carry that grace into the world and strengthen our love and bond with God and neighbor.
