A Message from the Pastor



Second Sunday of Lent: Bonds Loosed

On the second Sunday of Lent, the Gospel reading proclaims the story of Jesus' Transfiguration. This year, in Mark's report, the Transfiguration occurs after Peter's confession that Jesus is the Messiah and Jesus' prediction about his passion. There is also a discussion of the cost of discipleship. The Lenten season continues today with another story of testing.

Last Sunday, we heard the trial of Jesus in the desert. In this week's First Reading, we hear of how Abraham was put to the test. The Church has always read this story as a sign of God's love for the world in giving His only-begotten son. In today's Second Reading, Paul uses exact words drawn from this story to describe how God, like Abraham, did not withhold His only Son, but handed Him over for us on the Cross.

In the Gospel today, too, we hear another echo. Jesus is called God's "beloved Son" as Isaac is described as Abraham's beloved son. These readings are given to us in Lent to reveal Christ's identity and to strengthen us in the face of our afflictions.

Jesus is shown to be the true son that Abraham rejoiced to see. In His transfiguration, He is revealed to be the "prophet like Moses" foretold by God, raised from among their own kinsmen, speaking with God's own authority. Like Moses, He climbs the mountain with three named friends and beholds God's glory in a cloud. He is the one prophesied to come after Elijah's return. And, as He discloses to the Apostles, He is the Son of Man sent to suffer and die for our sins.

As we sing in today's Psalm, Jesus believed in the face of His afflictions, and God loosed Him from the bonds of death. His rising should give us the courage to face our trials, to offer ourselves totally to the Father, as He did, as Abraham and Isaac did.

In His Transfiguration, we see an anticipation of the glory of Jesus' Resurrection; Jesus instructs the disciples to keep secret what they have seen until after the Son of Man has risen from the dead. The disciples cannot possibly understand Jesus' Transfiguration until they also witness his passion and death.

We hear the story of Jesus' Transfiguration early in Lent, but we have the benefit of hindsight. In our hearing of it, we anticipate Jesus' Resurrection, as we prepare to remember Jesus' passion and death. Freed from death by His death, we come to this Mass to offer the sacrifice of thanksgiving, and to renew our vows as His servants and faithful ones.


Family businesses of the communities of Southtowns Catholic and the Lakeshore Catholic Faith will be showcased. All auction items donated by members of each group will be displayed individually.

Road to Renewal Update



It appears rumors have arisen on Social Media and even from pulpits that "our school was closing." Our Vicar Foraine asked us to stop the rumor. "There are no schools closing in our Vicariate." Then on Friday the Diocese released the news that a parish and school were closing in the North Towns, and the rumors twist a little and then persist.

In our modern times rumors rule. People can only hear what they are able to hear; what mindset they are in is how they filter everything they hear. So if you deny a rumor and the slightest or similar aspect appears to come true, you are a liar; if you don't deny a rumor, it is automatically true because you did not deny it. Either way we find it easier to believe all rumors and be skeptical of everyone and all authority, then constantly question everything or demand explanations diverting us from the path we are on.

In his memoirs, A Moveable Feast, when he was having difficulty writing, Ernest Hemingway once explained: "I would stand and look out over the roofs of Paris and think, 'Do not worry. You have always written before and you will write now. All you have to do is write one true sentence. Write the truest sentence that you know.' So finally, I would write one true sentence, and then go on from there. It was easy then because there was always one true sentence that I knew or had seen or had heard someone say."

The Church has always and will always proclaim the truth as given to us from Jesus Christ. Sometimes we believers find ourselves in a position where our world and our life make it hard to see this; or we become burdened and overshadowed by chaos and rumors or even mishandlings of what we expect from others and even the Church.

The Road to Renewal is ripe for this and even infuriating some. I have tried to anticipate and put out here what we are doing, taking into account people's input, the Diocese Guidance and the Church's Mandate. We are working out of one true sentence. I invite each of us during this Lenten Season to not worry, proclaim one truth of Jesus Christ to someone else, and allow the Holy Spirit to continue to pour out truth through US.
