A Message from the Pastor

Passion Sunday: Darkness at Noon

This Sunday, called Palm or Passion Sunday, is the first day of Holy Week. Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday are called the Triduum; three days that are the highlight of the Church year. During the Liturgy of the Word on Palm Sunday, the events of Jesus' Passion are proclaimed in their entirety. In Lectionary Cycle B, we read the Passion of Jesus as found in the Gospel of Mark. In Mark's Gospel, Jesus' passion and death are presented as the consequence of the tension between the Jewish authorities and Jesus that had been building throughout his public ministry.

Crowned with thorns, our Lord is lifted up on the Cross, where He dies as "King of the Jews." Notice how many times He is called "king" in today's Gospel, mostly in scorn and mockery. As we hear the long accounts of His Passion, at every turn we must remind ourselves: He suffered this cruel and unusual violence for us. He is the Suffering Servant foretold by Isaiah in today's First Reading. He reenacts the agony described in today's Psalm, and even dies with the first words of that Psalm on His lips.

Listen carefully for the echoes of this Psalm throughout today's Gospel. As Jesus is beaten, His hands and feet are pierced; as His enemies gamble for His clothes, wagging their heads, mocking His faith in God's love, His faith that God will deliver Him. Are we that much different from our Lord's tormentors? Don't we often deny that He is King, refusing to obey His only commands that we love Him and one another? Don't we render Him mock tribute, pay Him lip service with our half-hearted devotions?

In the dark noon of Calvary, the veil in Jerusalem's temple was torn. It was a sign that by His death Jesus destroyed forever the barrier separating us from the presence of God. He was God and yet humbled Himself to come among us, we're reminded in today's Second Reading. Despite our repeated failures, Jesus still humbles Himself to come to us, offering us His body and blood in the Eucharist. His enemies never understood: His kingship isn't of this world. He wants to write His law, His rule of life on our hearts and minds.

As we enter Holy Week, let us once more resolve to give Him dominion in our lives. We take up the cross He gives us and confess with all our hearts, minds, and strength that truly this is the Son of God. We prayerfully remember the events of Jesus' passion and death. As we meditate on the cross, we ask what it means to make the statement of faith that Jesus, in his obedient suffering and dying, revealed to us as God's Son.

Road to Renewal Update

Palms have a rich history. It was a commentation practice in the ancient world to welcome home walk or ride on. Today we commemorate the entrance of the King of Kings into Jerusalem with palm branches. Palms have also been recognized as a symbol of peace, victory, and eternal life.

Remember what they stand for: we now share in the peace, victory, and eternal life through Jesus' Passion and Resurrection. May this promise and hope be at the forefront of our heart as we journey through the renewal together, especially through Holy Week. This year we have been given a chance to experience the Passion of Jesus more intimately and to do it as an expanding community. Jesus' promise remains.

We have been caught up in trying to maintain our functioning as parishes and forming our working as a unified family. In fact, the "Family Pastoral Council" met this past week and sent our next steps to the clergy team for review and collaboration. This process is trying to balance our desires, the Universal Church directives, the local Church guidelines and the expectations and restrictions coming from the Chapter 11 and Litigation Process.

I have been very careful not to get too far ahead, because rumor and sometimes deceptive reports have abounded. There is a place for a final inclusion, but we need to be carefully prepared to help with expectations and reality.

Please remember there are many voices and strong personal beliefs and feelings, but our goal is to open our hearts and minds to the voice of the Holy Spirit, an extension of that promise from our Lord. In today's feast we laid down palms for Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem, but in essence it was for His Passion and Resurrection. Place your palms before the Lord. Let's keep working together and please do pray for one another and the process.
