A Message from the Pastor



Divine Mercy Sunday: The Day the Lord Made

Today's reading from the Gospel of John is proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Easter in each of the lectionary cycles. This fact alone

should alert us to the significance of the encounters with the resurrected Jesus that are described in this reading. This Gospel combines two scenes: Jesus' appearance to his disciples after his Resurrection and Jesus' dialogue with Thomas, the disciple who doubted.

Three times in today's Psalm we cry out a victory shout: "His mercy endures forever." Truly we've known the everlasting love of God, who has come to us as our Savior. By the blood and water that flowed from Jesus' pierced side, we've been made God's children, as we hear in today's Second Reading. Yet we never met Jesus, never heard Him teach, never saw Him raised from the dead. His saving Word came to us in the Church, through the ministry of the apostles, who in today's Gospel are sent as He was sent.

He was made a life-giving Spirit and He filled His apostles with that Spirit. As we hear in today's First Reading, they bore witness to His resurrection with great power. And through their witness, handed down in the Church through the centuries, their teaching and traditions have reached us. We encounter Him as the apostles did in the breaking of the bread on the Lord's Day. There is something liturgical about the way today's Gospel scenes unfold. It's as if John is trying to show us how the risen Lord comes to us in the liturgy.

In both scenes it is Sunday night. The doors are bolted tight, yet Jesus mysteriously comes. He greets them with an expression, "Peace be with you," used elsewhere by divine messengers. He shows them signs of His real bodily presence. And on both nights the disciples respond by joyfully receiving Jesus as their "Lord." Isn't this what happens in the Mass, where our Lord speaks to us in His Word, and gives himself to us in the sacrament of His body and blood?

Thomas represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of witnesses to Jesus. All but the first disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, who was crucified and buried, appeared to his disciples. Our human nature seeks evidence that the Jesus who appeared after his death is indeed the same Jesus who was crucified. Thomas gives witness to us that the Jesus who was raised is the same Jesus who died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed, for we have not seen and yet believe.

Let us approach the altar with joy, knowing that every Eucharist is the day the Lord has made; the victory of Easter is again made wonderful in our eyes.

Road to Renewal

Divine Mercy Sunday

Between 1931 and 1938, our blessed Lord appeared to Sister Faustina Kowalska, a young Polish nun with the message of Divine Mercy. Sister recalls these visions in her diary. One of the directions of our blessed Lord is recalled by her, "The Feast of Mercy emerged from my very depths of tenderness. It is my desire that it solemnly be celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the fount of My Mercy." Today, the universal Church celebrates this feast of Divine Mercy.

God's desire to give us His mercy is met by our desire to receive His mercy. This union of desire elevates our souls to deeper communion with our Lord and love of our neighbor. It is thus prudent to ask ourselves, how do we exhibit mercy in our own lives? Are we patient with others? Do we forgive those who seek forgiveness from us? Are we allowing the Lord to use us as an instrument for His mercy to spread across the globe?

We embark on another month of road to renewal meetings, listening, and planning. Please, with me reflect upon our Lord's desire for mercy. As we endeavor to grow faithfully and obediently within the process, we may struggle with perceived "change," frustration or disappointment. Remember God's Mercy and that it is our Desire to Receive it that we have a say in it. Then be merciful to others in all of what we are, especially in this process. And, be merciful to yourself; do not allow anything to draw you away from our Lord.

God is always merciful and present to us. Open the door of your heart and allow the grace of mercy to overcome you. And live it.
