A Message from the Pastor

Third Sunday of Advent: We are God's Children



This Sunday's Gospel invites us to continue our reflection on the person and mission of John the Baptist. We depart from the Gospel of Mark and read from the Gospel of John. Today's Gospel combines a

passage from the prologue with a report about John the Baptist. As in Mark, John contains no birth narrative. Instead, John's Gospel begins with a theological reflection that has come to be called the "prologue." It speaks of Jesus' existence with God since the beginning of time. Jesus is presented as the fulfillment of the Old Testament and the culmination of the Word, the light that is coming into the world's darkness.

Among the first philosophical principles I learned in school are the principle of identity and the principle of non-contradiction. "Identity" states that a thing is what it is and nothing else; while "non-contradiction" states that something cannot be and not be at the same time. One might imagine why are we looking at these philosophical principles today. The reason is that unless we accept the veracity of these statements, we may find it difficult accepting who we are or what we are at any moment. John the Baptist humbly demonstrated this for us.

Notice how the Jews sent the message to John the Baptist to reveal his identity to them. For want of respect, John could have presented himself as the Messiah or Elijah – those the Jews were longing to see. But instead, we are told he declared quite openly, 'I am not the Christ.' People live inauthentic lives just to have respect accorded them. But there is great joy in accepting the person you are. It is better for people to despise you because of who you are, than for them to honor you because of what you are not, or what you have claimed to be. The truth remains, to claim that you are what you are not cannot make you become that which you are not. There is a great rewarding humility in accepting who we are.

The only affirmative response that John the Baptist gives is when he quotes the prophet Isaiah. Upon answering that question, John announces that the Savior they seek is already among them, but as yet unrecognized. John's response highlights for us an important Advent theme: Jesus has already come into the world as our Savior.

Road to Renewal Update



As the procession for Mass began today, you may have noticed the priest and deacon wearing rose vestments. That is because today is Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete Sunday makes a breaker like

Laetare Sunday, about midway through a season, which is otherwise of a penitential character, and signifies the nearness of the Lord's coming. Of the "stations" kept in Rome the four Sundays of Advent that at the Vatican Basilica is assigned to Gaudete, as being the most important and imposing of the four. In both Office and Mass throughout Advent, continual reference is made to our Lord's second coming, and this is emphasized on the Third Sunday by the additional signs of gladness offered on that day. Gaudete Sunday is further marked by a new Invitatory, the Church no longer inviting the faithful to adore merely "The Lord who is to come," but calling upon them to worship and hail with joy "The Lord who is now nigh and close at hand."

We may all be busy with our Advent traditions and Christmas preparations, but that shall not stop us from moving forward in our Renewal. The Family Pastoral Council and the Clergy have been meeting regularly trying to implement the Family Action Plan. We are trying to weave them into our Christmas Festivities. These include open office hours, devotional schedules, and Lent.

More clarification is coming, but let us continue to pray for one another and our journey together. God for all of eternity will reign victorious, robed in splendor and glory; keep your eyes set on Him and the promise of the coming of His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

A Message from the Pastor

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During Advent, we pray that we will be able to recognize Jesus' presence in our midst. Advent also reminds us that Jesus will come again to fulfill the promise of salvation. We pray that we will continue to be watchful as we anticipate that great day.

For John the Baptist, the reward was that Jesus Himself proclaimed him (John) the greatest: "of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen....." Perhaps, John's greatness also included his ability to willingly accept who he was. Do you accept the fact that you are a baptized Christian and not a native doctor? Are you ashamed of what you are or who you are? The earlier we stop claiming what we are not, the better for us. Let us first accept who and what God has made us to be and then pray to God to take us up from there.

The third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete, a Latin word which means "rejoice," is taken from the entrance antiphon for Sunday's Mass. This theme is echoed in today's Second Reading from the First Letter to the Thessalonians. It is a reminder that Advent is a season of joy because our salvation is already at hand. And we are God's Children.

Beware Of Gift Card Scams

To stay safe online is to understand the tools scammers use to commit fraud. The most common scams involve imposter schemes, malware, phishing, and spoofing. The victim will be asked for personal information, money, or gift cards.

If you receive an email or text from the pastor, please pay close attention to the address or phone number. Fr. Tim will not solicit directly or ask for help or contributions from parishioners. These are scams that run through parishes on occasion. If in doubt, contact the parish office by phone. PLEASE DO NOT RESPOND to these texts or emails.

Scammers often create a sense of urgency while <u>convincing you to buy a gift card</u>, such as those from Google Pay, Amazon, or Apple Card, followed by providing them with the card number and PIN codes. No legitimate business or government agency will ever request that you pay them with a gift card. Always keep a copy of your gift card and store receipt and use them to <u>report any gift card scams to the company</u> and request a refund.

The more familiar you are with how fraudsters operate, the quicker you will recognize their scams and know how to react: Delete suspicious emails and texts; hang up on high-pressure calls; and don't send payments, click links, or download software.
